The purpose of this report is to advise committee of current 'good news' stories within the department.



1. DEPARTMENTAL

1.1 Year of achievements for Community Services staff

On Wednesday 26 January, over 150 staff from across the department attended the annual 'Celebration of Achievements' awards presentation, at Sir John Wilson Town Hall in Airdrie. The presentation was to celebrate a year of achievement, with awards from 28 nationally recognised bodies being received by teams and individuals.

These included Charter Mark awards for excellence in public service, ISO 9001 quality management awards, CoSLA Excellence Awards, a Fleet Operator of the Year award for Transport Services and a Vision in Business for the Environment (VIBES) award for the Time Capsule.

2. COUNTRYSIDE & LANDSCAPE

2.1 Cash boost for urban woodlands

North Lanarkshire is set for a £500,000 cash boost from the Scottish Executive, to help revitalise urban woodlands. The investment will be used to improve access, thin tree cover to open up more space and light, remove fly-tipping and provide better information and recreation facilities to help people enjoy their local woodlands.

As a result of the funding, Community Services and Planning & Environment will oversee three projects, in partnership with Central Scotland Forest Trust and the Forestry Commission.

- **Glencryan Woodlands** – These woodlands will form an off-road public access link from Cumbernauld to Palacerigg Country Park. Funding of over £152,000 has been allocated for this work.
- **Green Link, near Motherwell** – More than 1,800 metres of new cycleway will be constructed to link local settlements to new jobs at the regenerated Ravenscraig Steelworks site. The project will receive funding of £309,000.
- **North Lanarkshire Council** – A number of urban woodlands throughout the authority will be surveyed and their potential assessed as part of a management plan to improve their structure and diversity. A total grant of £40,000 has been awarded for this work.

3. SPORT & RECREATION

3.1 Nominations sought for annual Sports Awards

Nominations are being sought from the public for North Lanarkshire Council's annual Sports Awards. These provide an excellent platform for recognition of sporting talent throughout North Lanarkshire, across a number of categories. These include Senior Male and Senior Female, Junior Male and Junior Female, Coach of the Year, Senior Team of the Year, Junior Team of the Year and the Service to Sport Award.

The awards will culminate in a gala presentation dinner, which is being held on Friday 10 June at Motherwell Concert Hall.

4. CREATIVE SERVICES

4.1 North Lanarkshire gets into the Groove

In January, the Community Arts Team launched three new Scottish Arts Council funded initiatives at an event in Bellshill Cultural Centre. The initiatives include Groove Live (North Lanarkshire Youth Arts Festival), the Groove arts magazine and website for 12-25 year olds, and the Beetroot Recording Label.

Groove Live is a multi-artform event that offers young people aged 12-25 a wide ranging participatory arts and cultural programme. The festival is running during February and has already been very successful. All of the programmes for schools are fully booked.

The Groove arts magazine launched in January, and its accompanying website www.onlinegroove.co.uk, will be available from mid-February. The project aims to increase participation in the arts for young people.

The Beetroot recording label is currently being set up and will benefit the local musical community within North Lanarkshire, by allowing bands to release records on the fairest terms possible.

5. COMMUNITY LEARNING & DEVELOPMENT

5.1 Council to pilot electronic voting scheme for Youth Parliament

North Lanarkshire Council has been selected by the Scottish Youth Parliament to pilot one of the first elections in the world to use electronic voting.

The election, which is for North Lanarkshire's five Scottish Youth Parliament seats, will take place on 29 March. The department's Children & Young People Team will be leading the arrangements, which will enable those aged 12 and 25 to elect the member of their choice by using their Young Scot smart card online.

The electronic voting project, working under the title *E-Nation*, is a partnership of organisations under the umbrella of the Scottish Youth Parliament. It includes the Electoral Commission, Young Scot and YouthLink Scotland.

5.2 Successful start to the year for the Kilsyth & Villages Patch Team

The Kilsyth & Villages Patch Team has been enjoying a number of recent successes, including the delivery of a First Steps to Youth Work training course. The team has also worked with a group of ten young people from Banton, to enable them to complete the North Lanarkshire Challenge Emerald Award. The group took part in an historical re-enactment, undertook a five-mile woodland walk and carried out an environmental litter pick in Banton village.

The team has also been working with a group of Kilsyth women, called the 'Time for Us Group', which has recently been successful in its application for lottery funding. The group, which meets in Garrell Vale Community Centre, received funding of £2,860 from the National Lottery's Awards for All Fund. This will be used to run a learning course aimed at improving confidence and self-esteem.

5.3 Panto goes Gaelic at Greenfaulds

The North Lanarkshire Gaelic Youth Theatre recently took to the boards to perform the Gaelic pantomime 'Co ghoid a' Nollaig', at Greenfaulds High School in Cumbernauld. The

performances were attended by almost 200 people and attracted interest from Radio nan Gaidheal and other Gaelic organisations.

The youth theatre, which is the only one of its kind in Scotland, was established in 2004, following a series of theatre workshops at Condorrat Primary School. It now plans to apply to Bord na Gaidhlig for a grant to develop new projects in partnership with the council.

5.4 Grant to help North Lanarkshire's homeless

The ACCESS Initiative, based at Dalziel Workspace in Motherwell, has received a grant of £75,000 to develop an employability programme for North Lanarkshire's young adult homeless.

The 'PEOPLE' programme (Providing Employability Opportunities through Positive Learning Experiences) is tailored to the individual needs of those aged 16 to 24. It includes driving theory and practice, a residential outdoor education experience, an introduction to IT and the ECDL, a cookery programme, food hygiene, first aid, pool lifeguard training, fork lift truck driving and work experience. The programme will last for six months and will involve two three-month blocks, with 30 young adults participating.

6. LIBRARIES & INFORMATION

6.1 Cumbernauld Open Learning Centre receives top honours

Following a recent audit by the British Computer Society, the Open Learning centre at Cumbernauld Library has received an 'A' grading.

The 'A' grading has only been awarded to 3% of European Computer Driving Licence (ECDL) accredited test centres and represents a remarkable achievement by staff.

6.2 Improvement works continue at Cumbernauld Library

The latest phase of work to upgrade facilities in Cumbernauld Library is scheduled to begin during the second week of February. The work will include enhancements to lighting and will necessitate a short closure to the public.

6.3 Local children benefit from sponsorship and donations

Askews Library Services, the supplier of books to North Lanarkshire Council, has donated £500 towards children's activities. The money will be used to fund prizes for the popular annual schools quiz, together with other activities.

In Coatbridge, £2,500 has been donated to the library by Mr D Stevenson, for the purchase of children's books. Mr Stevenson wished to encourage the reading habit in Coatbridge children and decided to donate part of an inheritance to the library.

6.4 Generous libraries staff present cheque to cancer charity

Over £2,815 has been presented to Maggie's Cancer Caring Centre Lanarkshire, by staff from Libraries & Information. The money will be used towards the construction and running of the new complementary care centre at Wishaw General Hospital. The money was raised during a variety of events, including a 'virtual' Big Brother Branch Library, a coffee morning, a Mad Hatters tea party and various raffles. One member of staff, Elaine Guy, raised £300 by completing the Glasgow women's 10K.

7. CATERING

7.1 North Lanarkshire packs healthier lunchboxes

A leaflet designed to encourage healthier lunchboxes in schools has been developed by Catering Services, in conjunction with pupils. The leaflet, called 'Healthy packed lunch – a guide for parents', was launched at Cumbernauld's Whitelees Primary School, which is working towards achieving Health Promoting School status.

The leaflet is being distributed to all North Lanarkshire's primary schools and is part of the council's 'Hungry for Success' initiative. It contains many key messages for parents, on simple changes that will have long-term health benefits for their children.

'Healthy packed lunch' is the latest in a long line of initiatives designed to encourage healthier eating by the area's school pupils. Other schemes include the introduction of breakfast clubs, provision of free fruit to P1 and P2 pupils, water in schools and sports bars.
